

Mr. Starr suggests that the high inflation of the late 1970s contributed to growth in health care spending, which other countries had more systems in place to control. Likewise, Mr. Cutler points to related economic events before 1980 as contributing factors. The oil price shocks of the 1970s hurt economic growth, straining countries' ability to afford health care. "Thus, all across the world, one sees constraints on payment, technology, etc., in the 1970s and 1980s," he said. The United States is not different in kind, only degree; our constraints were weaker.





• Changes in U.S. Life Expectancy Over the 20th Century





• Trends in The Costs per Year of Life Gained




Health Spending and Life Expectancy at Birth, 1970-2014




 U.S. Life Expectancies by Income Compared to Mean Life Expectancies Across Countries







- -- They reflect successful implementation of social policies





Share of Population in Good or Very Good Health, 2015





• Share of Population Age 15 or Older Who Smoke Daily, 2015





Average Annual Liters of Alcohol Consumed Age 15 or Older, 2014

















Cumulative Change in Price, Utilization, and Spending, 2012-2016






Who Pays and Where Does the Money Go?
